'A Midsummer Night's Dream'


- Understanding the use of minor characters to build the comedy genre.
- Exploring dramatic tension through the development of plot and characters.

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- Understanding 'counterargument' and 'point of view'.
- Examining the relationship between characters through methods such as similes, metaphors and semantic field.





- Developing depth of interpretation by using the three-step- analysis.
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- Comparing the writers' perspectives in two non-fiction texts.
- Developing creative writing skills by using figurative language for effect.

Autumn Term

Autumn 1 'Of Mice and Men' by John Steinbeck

- Analysis of structural features such as setting, motif and character development.
- Analysis of word classes and beginning to analyse the use of semantic fields.
- Applying structure to creative writing, for example through character development.

Autumn 2 Creative Writing
