HEADTEACHER'S MESSAGE

THE LONELINESS OF THE LONG-DISTANCE RUNNER

ome long-distance races operate on an out and back basis. In other words, the runners race to a far point at what is usually the halfway point of the race and then they turn and return over the same ground to the finish.

Of course, there is a burst of optimism at the turning point, knowing that they are past the halfway marker, and they can now look to run as strongly as possible home to the finish line. However, the initial run out is also critical as they must not lose ground on their competitors, and they have to dig deep into their reserves of stamina and resolve if the going gets tough.

I am reminded of this style of race by the clocks going back at the start of half term and the fact that we are now entering a long period of dark nights until the clocks go forward next Spring. Of course, this period of the next few months can be likened to the run-out phase of the long-distance race. When the days get lighter next Spring much of the race will have been run and all our students will be left with the run to the finish. This will be most apparent for the exam years who have the very real finish line of the final examination, but it is true for every student in every year group in making sure they achieve everything they can in their current school year.

The key factor for every student and every family to remember is that no ground must be lost across the next few months. It will be dark; it will be cold, and it will, very likely rain. There will be moments of light too as various annual events and festivals occur but it is important, in terms of learning, that everyone stays the course.

There will be challenges as seasonal illnesses crop up, and there may

very well be other unforeseen challenges, but we must all do whatever we can



to be sure that when the light and warmth of the Spring returns that we are in a strong position to sprint home to success.

Finish lines are a strong symbol of completing a task, and so it is with a race and with a school year. I have given this piece the misleading title of the Loneliness of the Long-Distance runner after the celebrated short story of Alan SIllitoe. In this story the runner is on his own. The good news for everyone at Featherstone is noone is on their own. Instead, we will all be there to support each other and every student and member of staff as we live by the motto, "Together we Achieve." Here we go for another half term, and we are all here for you.
