A keen physics student, Former Deputy Head Boy, Gurdit, has been on an amazing journey over the past year with help from the Sutton Trust and his teachers at Featherstone High School.

The programme helps UK students apply to American universities and even features a funded week to the US to gain an insight into studying in the States. Gurdit said: "Over the past year I've been on the Sutton Trust US Programme and it has honestly been a life changing experience! I ended up applying to many US schools and got into Harvard, Princeton, Rice, and the Georgia Institute of Technology all with full scholarships. I've committed to Harvard and am so excited to go to the campus this autumn."

Reflecting on his years at Featherstone High, Gurdit concluded: "My school truly opened many doors and the multitude of opportunities that were provided to me over the 7 years were inspiring. I particularly would like to acknowledge Ms Samson who taught me physics for three years. She is such a role model and inspired me through every physics lesson we had. All my peers here were so supportive and I owe all my success to the brilliant teachers who have taught me and helped me over the years.

Featherstone High School Attendance Matters

Penalty Notice Fines for School Attendance are Changing!

With the introduction of the new National Framework for Penalty Notices, the following changes will come into force for Penalty Notice Fines issued after 19th August 2024.

Per Parent, Per Child

Penalty Notice Fines will now be issued to **each** parent, for **each** absent child.

<u>For example</u>: 3 siblings absent for term time leave, would result in each parent receiving 3 separate fines.

5 consecutive days of term time leave

Penalty Notice Fines will be issued for Term Time Leave of 5 or more consecutive days. Inset training days are school days and can be included in the 5 or more consecutive days where there was intent to be absent for term time leave.

10 sessions (5 days) of unauthorised absence in a 10-week period

Penalty Notice Fines will be considered when there has been 10 sessions of unauthorised absence in a 10 week period.

First Offence

The first time a Penalty Notice is issued for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance the amount will be:

£160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.

Reduced to £80 per parent, per child if paid within 21 days.

Second Offence (within 3 years)

The second time a Penalty Notice is issued for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance the amount will be:

£160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.

Third Offence and Any Further Offences (within 3 years)

The third time an offence is committed for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance a Penalty Notice will not be issued, and the case will be presented straight to the **Magistrates' Court**. Magistrates' fines can be up to **£2500** per parent, per child.

Cases found guilty in Magistrates' Court can show on the parent's future DBS certificate, due to 'failure to safeguard a child's education'.
